ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with hip roof. Foundation is skirted. Concrete steps, with wrought iron railing, lead up to enclosed porch with hip roof on north half of facade. Porch has a pair of double hung windows on facade. Door is paneled with two round arch vertical lights. Windows around house are double hung wood sash, one-over-one, with storm windows. Plank shutters on transom window are shades of green. Short gabled wing on south facade has a transom window. Yellow simple drop siding. White cornices. Brown and green fishscale and notched shingles on front gable face. Wood louvered ventilator on gable is flanked by small windows. Mullions have capitals, and look like small Doric pilasters. Brown composition shingle roof. Facade and south gable have ratum cornices. Brick chimney on west slope.

Landscaped with lawn, roses by porch, and locust and ash trees in parking area.

One car garage at rear now remodeled for other uses, with front gable, brown composition siding and yellow drop siding.

CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions): Enclosed porch and door are remodeled. Storm windows. Use change from commercial to residential, 1991. Additional construction or modifications not noted in Assessor's records.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Samuel Dixon was the first absentee owner, ca. 1909-1916, and Nora Patterson, ca. 1917-1920, the next. Anna and John S. Foster, Foster and Sons, were the owners/occupants ca. 1921-1925. Mabe and Robert T. Williamson, an engineer for Public Service, were the owners/residents ca. 1926-1932. M. Evelyn and Delaware Bennett, insurance, were the next owners/occupants, ca. 1933-1935. J. H. Lee was the absentee owner, ca. 1936-1941, and Agnus and Maurice Fitzgerald, principal for Ross Business College, the tenants in ca. 1937. Madeline and Roy Floyd, a mechanic for the Rio Grande Motorway, were the tenants in ca. 1941, and the owners ca. 1942. Mike and Ellen Stranger were the third absentee owners ca. 1943-1947, and M. Marie and Samuel Bell, Cala Lily Creamery, the tenants ca. 1947. This house, according to National Register nomination form and the North 7th Street Walking Tour Brochure, was found to be a structure contributing to the district. Although within a National District Boundary, a completed inventory record was not located for this building.
