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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One and a half story with side gable. Foundation veneered with uncoursed red sandstone. Carpeted steps lead up to porch extending across facade under principal roof. East two thirds of porch is screened. Siding on half-wall. Four squared half columns with cushioned capitals and bases across porch. Side entry from west end. Screen door at the west. Front door is paneled with a very large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, one-over-one. Projecting bay with shed roof on east elevation has paired windows. White false bevel siding. White trim, except for black paneled shutters on facade and west elevation windows. Dark gray composition shingle roof. Large, gabled dormer on north slope has two windows and a louvered ventilator at apex. Bay and dormer have exposed rafters. Principal roof has fascia boards. Brick chimney on south slope.

Landscaped with lawn, spirea, and ground cover along porch facade. Locust tree on west lawn. Wood fence around backyard. One car garage at rear. Front gable roof has green, hexagonal composition shingles. White simple drop siding. Batten doors on each end. Alley door slides on tracks. Shed roof carport added to north elevation of garage with green composition shingle roof.

Jennie and Frank Connor, a railroad clerk, were the owners/occupants ca. 1916; and Olive H. and Alonzo (Lon) Bradbury, one the area's earliest blacksmiths, the owners/occupants ca. 1917-1919. Chloe and Dr. Henry J. Hook, an osteopath, were the owners ca. 1920-1925, and the residents ca. 1924. Nellie and R.C. Newfarmer, an insurance agent, were the owners/occupants ca. 1926-1928. Georgia and Allen L. Holcombe, a city councilman and secretary-manager of the Currie Canning Factory, were the owners/residents ca. 1930-1935. Blanche and Charles W. Beck, a railroader, owned/occupied the house ca. 1936-1944. Ralph Hoover was the owner, and Eva and Louis A. Theobold, a maintenance man, the renters ca. 1946.


