ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with hip roof with gable wing extending from center of facade. Concrete steps with single wrought iron railing leads to small enclosed porch with hip roof situated on west side of facade. Half-wall of simple drop siding. Four full height squared porch posts. Ribbon of ten pane casement windows on west elevation of porch. Metal storm door. Main door is paneled with large light. Double hung wood sash windows, one over one, with metal storm windows around house. Bay with hip roof on west elevation. Wood simple drop siding and window frames are white. Cornice, fascia, corner boards, porch posts, louver opening and window surrounds are blue. Gray composition shingle roof with boxed eaves. Pedimented front gable has a kick and a wood louvered ventilator. Concrete steps and stoop lead to flush door with full vertical side lights in the center of west elevation. Steps and stoop are blue. Shed roof addition in rear. A second set of concrete steps and stoop in west elevation of addition. Flush door with full vertical side lights is the entrance to 240 N. 11 Street. Simple drop siding is white, trimmed in blue.

Landscaped with grass lawn with four large trees. Evergreen and shrubs frame front entrance. Front yard enclosed by metal wire fence fixed to 4x4 wood posts capped with finlals. Rear yard enclosed by combination of white picket and chain link fences.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): The house, constructed ca. 1904, was first owned by Frank Stauck, ida and Adolph Zielke, a carpenter/engineer, ca. 1907-1910. John J. Zielke, an attorney, was also a resident. Educator Miss Ada Copeland, was the owner/occupant ca. 1915-1928. During her residency, Ada served as principal of the Bryant and Riverside Schools, as principal of the Chipeta School, and as a teacher at Washington School. Josephine Copeland, who lived with Ada, was the absentee owner ca. 1929-1935. Tenants included a two railroaders. Theirna and Lewis Johnson, a carman for the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad, were the owners occupants ca. 1936-1946.
