

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with gable on hip roof. Battered foundation. Wood steps flanked by low wood piers lead to screened porch integral in east 2/3 of facade. A cross gable is over the porch entry. Wood screen door flanked by two large panel screens. Half wall and columns have siding. Main door is paneled with triple light and is flanked by two double hung wood sash windows, three over one. Windows around house are double hung wood sash, three-over-one. Small window with four vertical lights in gable. Pale yellow, false bevel wood siding. Window frames and surrounds, porch screen door, raking cornices and eave trim are light blue. Gray composition shingle roof with overhanging eaves and exposed rafter ends. Bargeboards on gables. Brick chimney in east slope with corbeled cap. Landscaped with lawn, two saplings in front yard, and a variety of shrubs and moderately sized trees around yard. Two large evergreens frame porch entrance. Sides and back yard enclosed by chain link fence. Single car garage in rear with front gable, gray composition shingle roof, and white simple drop siding.

The purpose of this letter is to fill in the "spaces" on the history of this residence.

Harlow S Manning was a preacher and carpenter. He built the homes at 115, 121 and 127 Gunnison. He lived at 115 Gunnison so he sold the other two houses when he finished building them. More later in this letter.

In July 1958, Yarnell sold it to Frank and Angelina Simonetti (my parents) who moved in during August 1958. We moved from our home at 111 North First Street where we had lived since 1922. That site is occupied by Two Rivers Motel. When we moved to this address, Mr. and Mrs. Manning were still living next door. They both remained there until their deaths (don't remember the dates). They had several children. Their son, Merton Manning, was student body president at Grand. Junction High School during my junior year: 1936-1937.

We knew the Nash family well. The father, a DARGW engineer was killed in a train wreck. During 1939-1941, I worked for the Rio Grande Truck Line as a freight clerk. Roger Nash, a son, was District Manager of this truck division. Some 35 years later Roger Nash came to the house to see what it was like. We were both surprised at this event. I showed him through it with delight. Strangely enough, some years later, a van with Iowa plates showed up with a young couple and several children looking for their grandparents home. We gladly showed them through. Gauthiers did not live in this house very long, selling it in 1947 to Denzel L. and Alice Yarnell. Mr. Yarnell was either Mesa County Assessor or Clerk/Recorder during a part of this period.

My parents celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary on June 1, 1991. Mother passed away in October, 1991. My father was 99 years old last September 23, 1996.

The only major change to the home was the removal of small cabinets, which created a small barrier between the living room and dining room. These glass-doored units were part of the pillars which seemed to support a visible beam on the ceiling. An expert cabinet maker removed the cabinets and by saving the wood was able to make repairs to extend the pillars to the floor in such a manner as to be the original plan. The result was one magnificent room with the appearance of separate rooms.
