

This house is a very unusual style for Mesa County. It was a mail order plan altered in some details. Its ripple glass and red with John Deere green trim make it unique in the area.

A.L. Zellers came to the area from Indiana to take up a garden tract and raise fruit. Zellers represents the "gentlemen farmers" who built fairly large houses and bought the high priced land for orchards (\$2,000 per acre). The Zellers owned the house for about 40 years. Then the Yarborough family purchased it. The Yarboroughs sold it in*


