ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with flat roof. Concrete foundation. Brick steps with curved corners ascend in a diminishing tier with wrought from railing down the center. Wood frame screen door over French front door. An overdoor is suspended from the wall by two chains. The overdoor is flat roofed, with cutaway corners. The two foot high metal valance is ribbed with three courses of horizontal metal. An entry on the west elevation has concrete steps and a smaller overdoor. Windows are six light, wood casements. A ribbon of three is on the west facade and a pair is on the east facade. Both windows have flower boxes, set in wrought iron holders with iron scroll braces underneath. Casement windows around the house are paired, and all have rowlock brick sills. Brown and white striped awnings on all the windows. Screens on most windows. Walls are other color, clay, hollow block tile. On the facade, a rectangular area which encompasses the door and windows is painted russet. On the four corners, a vertical, russet band, two feet wide, is painted the full height of the corners. All the windows around the house have russet painted rectangular surrounds, which continue down to the russet foundation. An even parapet is around the flat roof. Over the windows, the parapet is interrupted by openings which have a rowlock brick coping. A brick chimney is on the flat roof, with a tall, metal extension.

Minimal lawn with large evergreens across the facade. Large evergreen trees flank the driveway. Elm trees in the parking area. A wire and barbed wire fence is around the property.

One car garage at rear has flat roof, board and batten siding, and russet batten doors.



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (briefly justify the significance checked above): Block tile houses were popular in the 1940s and 1950s. This house, with influences from Modern Architecture, is basically unmodified except for the eccentric paint. It was built by a contractor for his family and it has more design touches than was usual, e.g. the modernistic overdoor and wrought iron flower box holders. Although not eligible for the National Register, this house may contribute to a local register.
