ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with pyramidal hip roof. Concrete steps, parallel to the street, lead to side entry of screened porch with front gable roof, occupying center 2/3 of facade. Porch half-wall is covered with shake shingles down to the ground level. Ribbons of thin wood frame screens with screened transoms on all three sides of porch. Wood screen porch door on west side of porch. Front door is paneled with three tall, narrow vertical lights. Windows around house are double hung wood sash, one-over-one, with metal frame storm windows. White shake shingle siding. Skirted foundation covered with white shake shingles. Porch screen frames, front door, window frames and surrounds, exposed rafters and bargeboards are dark brown. Brown corrugated metal roof with exposed rafters. Brick chimney on ridge.

Lawn with two mature trees along street. Two evergreen shrubs along porch facade. Four tilac bushes along east side yard. Mature and several young trees in backyard. East side of lot enclosed by white wood fence. Carport with squared posts and knee braces in back yard.

Single car garage in rear with front gable roof covered with metal ridge roofing. White simple drop siding.


