ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with pyramidal hip roof. Concrete foundation. Front gable wing extends from center of facade. Steps, formed by railroad ties, lead to open porch, with a flat roof, on the west side of facade. Single, full height, 6x6 porch posts and 2x4 wood railing on porch. Porch base made of alternating sections of railroad ties and short sections of double rows of bricks. Metal, paneled front door with large, diamond pane light. Windows around house are double hung, wood sash, one over one, with metal storm windows. An enclosed sunporch projects from the east side of the facade with hip roof. Porch is glazed with ribbons of six light windows in facade and a ribbon of fixed pane windows on the east elevation of the porch. House is faced with pale yellow narrow lapped vinyl siding. Window frames and surrounds, corner boards, raking cornices and cornice returns are dark brown. Copper color metal ribbed roof with boxed eaves. Ridges covered with notched, raw wood planks. Short, brick chimney in peak of pyramidal hip roof has a metal extension.

Yard with brick walk and gravel yard along street. Variety of young trees in front yard. Row of hedges along sidewalk. Small gambrel roof shed in rear with brown composition roof shingles and pale yellow plywood siding.

Roberts. The house was used as a rental property ca. 1925 through at least 1946, with such tenants as a salesman, fireman, students and brakemen for the railroad. The renter in 1946, was Melvin Baldwin, a packager with the Salt Lake City Hardware Company.


