ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with pyramidal hip roof. Foundation skirted with wood planks painted red. Concrete steps lead to enclosed sunroom/porch that occupies half of the shed roof addition extending across the facade. Asbestos shingle siding on half-wall. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): The first owners of this house were Charles and Dora Strock, who lived there ca. 1905-1922, Mr. Strock began as a foreman for Grand Junction Smelting Company and, later, was a clerk for the Little Bookcliff Railroad. Ralph Spence, a fireman, and wife, Edith, lived in the house ca. 1923-1924. The house served as a rental ca. 1925-1937 with tenants including: a salesman, shipping clerk, waiter and railroad fireman. Mary Siebert purchased the house in 1938 and lived there ca. 1939-1943 with husband, Adam. The tenants in 1946 were Mary and John Richardson.


