ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story, flat roof with parapet. Building is divided into two sections. In the center is a projecting two story elevator shaft/stairwell. The east half of the building is divided into four bays marked by thick concrete pilasters. Two bays have large wood panel doors on the first and second floor. Two other bays have paneled doors on the first floor and narrow openings with concrete sills on the second floor. These openings are now boarded up. The west half of the building, with a lower roof, projects 2' beyond the elevator shaft. It is also divided into four bays by two story concrete pilasters. Each bay has a large double hung, wood sash window, eight over eight. Above the pilasters of both sections is a simple cornice and a low attic punctuated with regularly spaced rectangular openings. The elevator shaft also includes a cornice and attic that projects above both lower sections of the building. The entire structure is made of reinforced poured concrete. Facade is painted white.

A concrete platform scale is flush with the ground on the east side of the lot. The scale house, to the immediate west of the scale, is a flat roof structure, 5' X 8'. A flush door is on the south elevation. A metal framed window is on the other three elevations. Blue fiber board clapboard siding. Three parallel concrete walls, 5' height and 10' apart, are on a north-south axis in the center of the lot. A lateral concrete wall, originally part of coal loading chutes, encloses the rear. Behind the concrete walls is a storage building with shed roof. Blue, vertical wood siding. The paneled door has a light. Chain-link fences encloses the rear of the lot.


