ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story, side hip-on-gable roof. Battered foundation. Concrete steps, with wrought iron railings, lead to small porch on center of facade. Cast "permastone" half-wall down to ground level. Hip-on-gable canopy with decorative brackets and barge boards. French front door with metal frame storm door. Windows around house are varied. Majority of windows are double hung, wood sash, four, five and six over one, with metal frame storm window and screens. Windows on the west elevation have metal awnings. One casement window on the east side of facade and two mull windows on the east elevation. Light gray composition shingle roof with overhanging rafter eaves, exposed rafter ends, bargeboards and knee braces on the gable ends. Light green clapboard aluminum siding. Knee braces, barge boards, exposed ends, and porch brackets are white. Window frames are black. Skirted basement with aluminum siding and three, double pane, basement windows on west elevation. Brick chimney on south slope.

Landscaped grass lawn with rows of trimmed hedges on the east and west sides of front lawn. Thick evergreen hedges along facade. Backyard enclosed by a chain-link fence.

Paved driveway on east side of lot leads to a one car garage next to house. Garage has flat parapet roof with a false gable facade, and white false bevel siding.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Listed as built in 1920, there are no improvements at this location prior to 1926, when the house was owned by Louise and Earl T. Marsden. They owned and occupied the house through 1937, when it became the home of Edna and Andrew Bradford through at least 1946. Mr. Bradford was a fireman with the Denver and Rio Grande Railway. Earl Marsden, born 1884 in Blackhawk Township, lowa came to Colorado in 1905. He was a resident of Grand Junction for 54 years and building contractor during that time.


