ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story with pyramidal hip roof and a hip roof wing. One story, flat roof commercial additions. The house has double hung, metal sash windows, one-over-one. The windows have red awnings. The one story addition on the west elevation extends from the house to the front sidewalk. The northwest corner of the addition is cutaway. A wide concrete terrace with two wide steps fronts the cutaway. A metal frame door with a full light is on the cutaway and is flanked by full-height, single light sidelights. On the 5th Street facade is a show window. On the north elevation is a fixed light, flanked by metal frame sliding windows. Windows and door have a single red awning, which wraps around the corner. Siding of house and addition is buff clapboard wood. Window and door surrounds, frieze, fascias, and corner boards are ivory. Light red composition shingle roof. The boxed eaves have fascia boards. The flat roof of the addition has a wide overhang, with a fascia. A sign is on the flat roof. Brick chimney is on the A coursed, red stone planter is on the facade, with two evergreens. At the rear of the house is a large, one-story buff concrete block addition with no windows. The front gable roof is very low pitch. Two flush doors on

the east elevation open to chain-link dog runs.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building). First owned ca. 1900 by May V. Thompson, the first known occupant of this house was Lidia Baker (widow of John) who occupied and owned the house ca. 1905-1916, apparently using it for "furnished rooms" rentals. Della Shepard (widow of A.L.) was the owner/occupant 1925-1925. Della and Dewey Lupton, a laborer, owned and lived in the house ca. 1927-1932. Pete Maraschin owned the house ca. 1933-1944 and used it as a rental property with tenants including a laborer with the highway department. Ida Klein in 1943, was renting out the house as "furnished rooms." Tenants in 1946, were a miner and a brakeman with the Denver and Rio Grande Railway. The house has now been completely enclosed as part of the "All Pets Veterinary Clinic."


