ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story, cross gable roof. Rusticated block foundation. Concrete steps with rusticated block piers and a single 2 x 4 railing, leads to an enclosed porch with flat, low parapet roof situated on the south east corner of house. Porch glazing consists of three wood frame casement windows, three over one, on the east elevation. Porch facade has a flush door with single, small, square light with single pane transom. Single, wood frame casement windows, three over one, flank the porch door. Porch roof parapet is paneled. Original hipped roof addition on the west elevation is glazed with ribbons of double hung, metal sash windows with metal frame screens. A ribbon of nine is on the west elevation. Addition has flush entry door. Majority of windows around house are double hung, wood sash, one-over-one. Large, fixed pane picture windows with metal awnings appear on facade and west elevation. Green asbestos shingle siding. Porch door and paneled parapet, addition door, window frames and surrounds, and raking cornices are white. Light green composition roof shingles with boxed eaves. Brick chimney is on the east slope.

Landscaped yard with two mature elm trees next to street. Flower bed along facade. Two small evergreens on corners of facade. West side of lot and backyard enclosed by tall chain link fence.

Metal shed in rear.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): A.E. Bedwell is listed as the first owner of this house, constructed ca. 1897. It shows up on the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps in 1904 when this part of Grand Junction is first documented. George Stuart, an engineer with the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, was the occupant, ca. 1898-1901, and the known occupant, ca. 1902-1906. Mary and George Hartnett, a conductor, owned/occupied the house, ca. 1907-1942. Their son Clarence and his wife, Mary S., also occupied the house, ca. 1930. Owners/occupants, ca. 1943 to at least 1947, were Ophelia and Wesley S. Gregg, a railroad conductor.
