George Crawford selected the town site on Sept. 26 1881,
incorporated the Grand Junction Town Company, and platted a
section of land for town development in typical grid fashion.
Boundaries were established at North and South avenues and First
and Twelth streets. Corners were set aside for churches, blocks
for school buildings (between Fifth and Sixth streets and White
and Rood avenues), parks - Maple, Walnut Chestnut and Cottonwood
(names later changed to Whitman, Emerson, Hawthorn, and
Washington, respectively)- were designed for each quarter section
of the original town platte. This structure is located within
the original platted area and is representative of the 1910s town
building era.
