This Eastern Stick style two-story house is a very unusual style in the survey area. It was built in 1897 for Mr. Page. Page played an important role in the building of the Glen Canyon Dam.

The house was built of fine grained local red sandstone. The second story is frame. The timbering was painted a darker shade so it would stand out. The double parlor has high windows, the upper third of which is brilliant stained glass. The fireplace mantle is beautiful milled maple.
