ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One story with a front gable. Broad wood steps lead to open terrace extending across facade. The center third of the terrace has a gabled porch roof. There is a shingled pier at both front corners of the terrace, and two piers flank the steps. The pair of piers by the steps each support a shingled column. A tie beam rests on the columns. The roof above is supported by a king post and four angled posts which rest on the tie beam. Railings on porch between piers with wood braces forming an "X". Front door is paneled with four vertical, beveled lights. Windows are double hung wood sash, twelve, eighteen, and twenty-one over one. A projecting bay window on the west elevation bay is under the eave of the roof, and is supported by knee braces. Pink asbestos shingle siding. Steps, coping of porch, piers, columns, and porch gable timbers, door and window surrounds, bargeboards, and knee braces are white. Window frames and muntins are green. Light gray composition shingle roof with bargeboards. Knee braces under eaves of principal roof. Brick chimney on ridge.

No lawn. Flagstone along lawn edge by sidewalk. Two large, trimmed catalpa trees in parking area. Chain link fence around backyard.

Two car garage at rear with hip roof, gray composition shingles, white simple drop siding, and two sliding batten doors.

CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions): Asbestos shingle siding. Mill tailings removed in 1988.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): The first owners of this house, constructed ca. 1920, were H. B. Woods and J.G. Conley. Jennie and Chris Hinkey were the next owners, ca. 1924-1936, living in the house ca. 1926-1928, and using it as a rental the rest of the time. It was briefly owned/occupied by Helen and Harry Morse, a teacher, ca. 1937-1938. After 1938 it became home to owners Willard and Sallie Lewis until 1985. Mr. Lewis was a conductor with the Denver and Rio Grande Railway.
