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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One and one half story with side gable. Foundation skirted with shingles. Concrete steps with low risers of half the usual height, and pipe railings. Porch in center third of facade has a continuous shed roof that is flared. Siding on half-walls. Four squared piers across porch. Squared half columns on two porch corners. Storm door over paneled front door with large light. Windows are double hung wood sash, 20, 30, 40 lights over one. Bay on west elevation has hip roof. White narrow lapped siding. Door and window surrounds, foundation shingles, water table, columns, bargeboards, knee braces are gray. Facade roof is cedar shingles laid with shadow lines. Gray composition shingles on south slope. Large gabled dormer on north slope has a ribbon of three double hung windows, and a circular ventilator in the apex. Flanking the large dormer are two small shed roof dormers, each with a casement window with 5 vertical lights. Knee braces under the eaves of gables. Gray brick chimney on south slope. Landscaped with lawn, large rose bushes across facade, and poplars and pine trees on the west elevation. Blue ash tree in parking area.

Two car garage with front hip on gable, wood shingle roof, white drop siding, and two paneled wood doors. Alley access.

CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions): Front steps. Fireplace chimney on west elevation was removed. Dr. Knebel had the long flight of low rise steps installed for the sake of elderly patients. Additional construction or modifications not noted in Assessor's records.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Constructed ca. 1909, the house was first owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Marcus M. Shores. Shores, then Mesa County Treasurer, was the son of legendary western lawman, Doc Shores. The house was owned ca. 1915-1936 by pioneer Whitewater fruitgrower, W.H. Coffman. Renters included, ca. 1922-1926, Katherine and Charles H. Fletcher, a railroad clerk; and ca. 1928-1932, Nola and Thomas Roberts, manager of the Armour Company. Edna and Wayne J. Chiesman, a superintendent for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, were the owners/occupants ca. 1937-1941. Louise and Walter Knebel, a chiropractor, were the owners/residents ca. 1941-1949. His office was in his house.
