ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two story with a front gable gambrel roof. Concrete block foundation. Concrete steps lead up to enclosed, porch with hip roof extending across three-fourths of the facade. Two full height squared columns and two responds are on the corners. Brown stained lapped wood siding. Four large, single light, fixed windows are across the porch facade. Metal storm door. The door has a full light and full height sidelights. Pairs of metal frame, single light sliding windows on end walls. Windows around the house are double hung wood sash, one-over-one, with metal frame storm windows. On the first floor, the sills and lintels are rusticated stone. The walls of the first floor are brick laid in common bond and painted gray. An ornamental brick band, a course of staggered headers, framed above and below by a course of stretchers, is around the house at lintel level. The window surrounds, foundation, frieze and cornices, sills, lintels and ornamental brick are darker gray. Gray composition shingle roof. Gambrel roof has a stepped cornice where the slope changes pitch. On east and west slopes are wide dormers with hip roofs; the stepped cornices continue around the dormer eaves. Gables are pedimented. Dormers and gable faces have gray, lapped wood, siding. Brick chimney with a corbeled cap on the east slope. A shed roof wing with gray, lapped wood siding, extends across the rear. It has an outside stairway leading to a second floor

Forsythia on west lawn. Chain-link fence around the back yard. Storage shed by alley.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Gregor Friedman, a carpenter, was the first owner/occupant, ca. 1908. There are no further listings in the City Directories until 1926, when it was the home of Don and Anna Hendershott, a brakeman with the Denver and Rio Grande Railway. Mr. Hendershott passed away by 1935, but Anna, and sons Don, Jr. and William lived there until ca. 1947 when it was sold to L. C. Nowlan.
