ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: One and half story with side gables and a gabled wing. Wood shingle skirted foundation. Concrete steps. Sunporch/entry with hip roof on west half of facade. Wood shingle siding on half-wall. Three full height, squared fluted wood columns across the porch. Glazing is ribbons of large single lights. French front door. Gabled wing on the east facade has a wide picture window on the first floor. The second floor gables have ribbons of metal sash casement windows. Other windows are double hung, wood sash, one-over-one. Metal frame storm windows. Buff clapboard wood siding. Door and window surrounds, door, shutters, frieze and cornices are russet. Russet composition shingle roof. Frieze has vertical ribbed wood siding. Boxed eaves have cornices. Metal flue has a housing with buff wood siding on the west eave wall of the front wing. Brick chimney on the north elevation.

Lawn with white birch tree, bulb plants and other ornamental trees are across the facade. Poplar trees by east elevation. Ash trees on parking. Chain-link and wood fence is around the backyard.

One car garage with front gable, russet roll composition roofing, buff board and batten wood siding, and metal door. Alley access.

CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (include description and dates of major additions, afterations, or demolitions): Picture windows, steel casement windows and porch glazing. Re-roofed, 1983. Open porch enclosed in 1983.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (discuss important persons and events associated with this building): Although the house is listed as being built in 1904, it shows up on the tax records as early as 1897 when it was owned by M.J. Bell and later, the M. J. Bell Estate of Colorado Springs. Edward E. Chapin was the owner/occupant, ca. 1905; Clarence Hunter, a carpenter for S. E. Winterburn, 1909-1910; and Winifred and Harry Cheedle, a rancher, ca. 1912-1924. Ora and Hugh Kimmel of Hugh Kimmel and Groton Brothers were the owners and residents, ca. 1925-1926; and Frank R. Hall, ca. 1927-1928. Charles and Cora Summers were the owners/occupants, ca. 1929-1942. Mr. Summers began as a repairman with Public Service Company and went on to become the city electrical inspector. Nina and Robert Houdashelt, R. Houdashelt Warehouse and Distributors, were the owners and residents, ca. 1945-1946. Walter Dalby, Dalby and Wendland, was the owner by 1946.


