Summary-

3/1 – 24 Road Stop-N-Save – a male subject robbed the store with a handgun, got away with an unknown amount of money, thirty minutes later a carjacking occurred near Rio Linda Lane and Redlands Parkway that appeared to be the same subjects from the robbery; 951 Highway 6 & 50 – 15 year old male pulled a knife on his mother, info was from a second hand RP, further investigation discovered no crime occurred; 107 Bonnie Vista, Unit C – a juvenile texted 911 to report her grandfather was touching her inappropriately; 219 W Fourth Street – RP reported an unknown male subject trying to enter the residence, subject was gone when law enforcement arrived.

3/2 – 2719 H Road – 23 year old male found unresponsive, hanging in his closet, was upset over a break up with his girlfriend.

3/5 – 19700 Highway 141 – Semi-truck caught on fire, which spread to a shed on the property; 777 26 Road – Structure Fire – started from a controlled burn, spread to a barn that was fully engulfed; 3118 D Road – suicidal male subject armed with a rifle, refused to come out of the residence without his gun, the SO was unable to make any progress in contacting the subject; 15th & Glenwood – shots fired at a large party, multiple people ran from the residence, two subjects were detained at gunpoint; Two subjects were held at gunpoint behind Quincy's; CMU

Garfield Hall – intoxicated female reported unconscious, breathing, was transported to the hospital.

3/7 – Highway 139/X Road – SARC was deployed to the desert area for a subject who had been lost since the day before, was found and taken to St. Mary’s for hypothermia; 337 S 1st Street – one vehicle rollover, elderly female driver was taken to St. Mary’s with multiple injuries; 281 Pine Street – burglary suspect ran from the address, K-9 unit was called out and quickly tracked the suspect; GJ Regional Airport – one jet with two on board lost the hydraulics, brakes and had a fire indication problem, during this incident another small engine plane requested to land with unknown emergencies, both landed without incident; Several crashes occurred in the same time period – 30 Road/I-70B, 30 Road/D ½ Road, Patterson/27 ½ Road, two patients transported total; GJPD followed a DUI driver who was finally brought to a stop with a tactical vehicle intervention technique after the driver hit a patrol vehicle, no officers were injured, the suspect’s vehicle caught on fire; 525 Rado Drive – vehicle hit a tree, 50 year old female driver had to be extricated, was transported to St. Mary’s with multiple injuries including a partially amputated arm.

3/9 – 23 ½ Road / Desert – SARC was deployed for a male dirt bike rider with a compound leg fracture, CareFlight transported patient; 463 E Scenic Drive – RP called in a verbal between his mother and father, officers arrived and resolved that issue, were then told by the female subject that the male subject is a felon and in possession of weapons, male subject fled the address, SWAT and IDT responded, house was searched where weapons were found but the male subject was not there.

3/10 – 1406 Texas Avenue – neighbor reported a male subject was breaking in to the address, officers arrived and determined the subject was allowed to be there, various drugs were found at the address; Garfield County informed the Center of an in progress pursuit, DeBeque Marshal’s Office found the vehicle near 2nd/Denver in DeBeque, subject was detained at gunpoint; 2892 North Avenue – First National Pawn – subject took a handgun from an employee and attempted to flee, employees only were able to detain for a short period, subject fled and was later detained at the Brass Rail with the firearm.

3/12 – D Road/28 ½ Road – suicidal male with a concealed weapon, male was detained without incident; 567 Sol Lane – prowler attempting to get in to resident’s yards, male was detained with incident.

3/13 – 323 N Mulberry - Fruita PD detained a male subject who fired several rounds from a pistol in to his backyard, no injuries; 880 21 ½ Road - GJFD and LVFD responded to a brush fire that threatened corrals and a barn with animals, was controlled quickly.

3/16 – 320 Belford Ave – a person of interest in an attempted murder case was believed to be at the address, subject and a possibly related party were cooperative and taken in to custody; I-70 mile marker 36 – vehicle flipped over and caught on fire; 23rd Street/Bunting Ave – three subjects ran from a vehicle during a routine traffic stop, one male walked back, the driver was intoxicated, perimeter was set and a third male was contacted near 25th and Bunting.

3/17- New Community Hospital opened, transport of patients went smoothly; 3021 N 14th Street – three year old female reported unconscious and not breathing, child was DOA; 655 24 ½ Road – brush fire was reported with a suspicious subject walking away from the area, GJFD responded with mutual aid from LVFD; Colorado/Utah state line – Grand County Sheriff, Utah responded to a possible dead body found near Mesa County/state line, MCSO was notified but did not respond; 239 N Ash St-Fruita – RP arrived home and found two males that had entered the residence through an open, screened window, the subjects ran from the address, were later detained and found with several firearms stolen from the residence; I-70 mile marker 4 – vehicle was on fire, eastbound lanes were closed for a short time; 2031 Manor Ave – suicidal male shot

a round into the ceiling of his address then called 911 because he “went too far”; 1252 Santa Clara Ave – GJPD responded to address after a female patient went to St. Mary’s with injuries, the subject at the residence was taken in to custody without any issues.

3/18 – 405 W First St-Palisade – vehicle was taken from address, no suspects known; Downtown was relatively calm despite the Insane Clown Posse concert at The Mesa Theater.

3/19 – N 1st St/Grand Ave – male subject was standing in the middle of the road, caused dozens of calls, was eventually taken to Mind Springs; 2801 Mesa Ave – residential structure fire; GJFD responded and successfully retrieved one male and two dogs from the back of the house; 3021 Grand Meadow Ave – 15 year old male shot his 6 year old niece with an airsoft gun, left the address and returned threatening suicide, several officers were on scene for an extended period of time, the six year old did not sustain serious injuries.

3/21 – Horizon Drive/Village Inn – male subject in the parking lot fired shots into the air, no injuries were reported, and the male was detained by Officers after a short search.

3/24 – 2908 Dawn Drive #1 - male subject chased two people with a knife, he was taken in to custody without incident; 509 28 ½ Road – male subject punched another male, then backed over him with his vehicle, the intoxicated driver left the scene but was later detained, victim was transported to St. Mary’s with leg injuries; Area of 15th St & North Ave – intoxicated male driving a vehicle hit multiple cars and fences in the area, was taken in to custody.

3/25 – Highway 65/Mile Marker 34 – female that was snow shoeing fell in to a hole and became stuck, Deputies and Plateau Valley Fire contacted her and walked her out, she did not have any injuries; 140 Landsdown Road – 35 year old female fatally shot herself in her backyard; 1135 Main St. – male subject broke into the address and was chased by a resident, he dislocated his knee when he jumped the backyard fence, was quickly found due to his loud moaning behind the address in the alleyway.

3/26 – 522 Jay Lee Street – assault reported by a passerby, the male subject was dragging a female into a house and threw her onto a couch, when deputies arrived the male indicated the female had taken a handful of pills, the female was detained, combative and taken in to custody.

3/27 – 29 Road/I-70 B – pedestrian vs. motorcycle, two patients were transported to St. Mary’s, C3; 544 32 1/8 Road #3 – child caught a mattress on fire, the apartment building was evacuated, fire was contained to the room with the mattress; Southeast area of Mesa County – SARC called out for an elderly couple who’s vehicle was stuck in the snow.

3/30 – VA Hospital-East Parking Lot– male found with a gunshot wound to the head in the bed of a pick-up truck; 12th & Bookcliff – three vehicle crash, minor injuries; 534 28 ¾ Road – 15 year old male tried to jump out of a window to get away from his mother after he had taken Prozac and other unknown drugs, he was transported to Mind Springs; 582 ½ Clifton Way – vehicle was on fire in front of the residence, was extinguished quickly and no other structures were threatened; CMU Rec Center – a male was reported loitering in the area, he was contacted and found to be a missing inmate from Delta County and was taken to DYC.

3/31 – I-70/Mile Marker 18 – female was found in a vehicle on the side of the road having a seizure, RP had contact with the female outside her vehicle, thought she might possibly be on drugs, when CSP and Lower Valley arrived the female took off in her vehicle toward the Utah state line, CSP was unable to locate the vehicle; 1204 N 7th - Hill & Homes/State Farm – structure fire that was mostly extinguished with the sprinklers, smoke increased when water was shut off, found a fire in the attic/HVAC system; Three CHILD calls came in during the night, all found children, not lost.

Summary (crime scenes activity, court appearances, complex cases, use of resources, problems or unusual events):

2030 drug and paraphernalia items were destroyed this month.

Trent Rundquist had five trainees, four from CBI and one from the Northern Colorado Regional Forensic Laboratory, in the month of March. He spent one week in Denver and one week in Pueblo with these trainees, reviewing their documentation from the academy, and then training them on topics that were either not covered or not covered well in the academy. By the end of each week, both trainees began their competency tests. He worked with two other trainees, one from CBI-Denver and one from the NCRFL, and helped them prepare for mock courts, in addition to working with them through other modules in the CBI training plan. Both passed successfully. Three trainees were in mentored casework this month. During mentored casework, Trent is required to perform all technical and verification reviews on the cases assigned to them to make sure they are documenting their results correctly.
