 $4/1 - 31 \frac{1}{2} \text{Road} / \text{I-70}$ Business Loop – hit and run, vehicle versus pedestrian, suspect's vehicle was stopped at 32 Road for a headlight out, pedestrian did not survive his injuries.

4/2 – Rimrock Walmart – subject with a warrant out of California was contacted and taken in to custody without incident; N 1st Street & Grand Avenue – single vehicle motorcycle crash, driver appeared to be intoxicated and was taken in to custody, female passenger was transported to St. Mary's.

4/3 – City Market on Rood – robbery attempt, male suspect gave a note to a clerk and indicated he had a gun, LE contacted the subject and took him in to custody without incident; Fire channel was extremely busy – ran out of ambulances for multiple agencies, multiple times; 3764 Front Street, Palisade – domestic violence occurred, the male subject left the address after assaulting his girlfriend, stole a bottle of alcohol from Columbine Liquors and some Snapple from Family Food Town, was detained in front of Palisade Living Center and uncooperatively taken in to custody.

4/4 - 4454th Avenue Unit 19 – a male subject discharged a handgun after an altercation with a female, the RP was delivering food in the area and called in the incident 15 minutes after it had occurred, Officers responded to the address and the male subject came out of the residence without incident; 2797 Justice Drive-CBI – a suspicious male was at the address, CBI had

contacted the male earlier in the day at Grand Junction Chrysler when he showed up at the business with a holstered weapon and an officer's badge, CBI confiscated the badge (that belonged to his brother), GJPD responded to the call at CBI, returned the badge to the brother and gave the subject a warning; 573 Commercial Drive – RP called in to report a truck leaking possible hazardous chemicals, GJFD responded and determined the vehicle was leaking liquid O2 and compressed gas, the owner of the vehicle was notified; 325 W Highland –Street Crimes responded to the residence for two wanted subjects and after almost four hours on scene, both subjects were detained and taken in to custody; St. Mary's – 19 year old female came to the hospital in labor with her 19 year old boyfriend, when the boyfriend goes downstairs to get a drink the female tells the nurse her boyfriend assaulted her earlier that day and other times in the past few months, also was isolating her from her family, SO responded to the hospital and took the male in to custody; GJFD responded to a dumpster fire near 24th Street and Belford, fire was contained and extinguished without causing other structure damage.

4/7 – 3975 Purdy Mesa Road – Lands End FD worked a brush fire, with assistance from Central OM Fire and GJFD, one residence was evacuated and up to two acres were burned; Mesa County Jail – GJFD responded for a 50 year old male inmate who jumped from an upper floor and suffered traumatic head injuries; 2471 Riverside Parkway – pickup truck drifted into oncoming traffic and collided with a loaded dump truck, pickup truck driver sustained serious injuries and was transported to the hospital.

4/8 - 1035 Wellington Ave – two vehicle crash, passenger car rolled, 70 year old male patient taken to St. Mary's with injuries; Colorado Mesa University – hip hop concert resulted in several ambulances called for intoxicated subjects during the event; 12^{th} Street & Ute Ave – an intoxicated male passenger jumped out of a moving vehicle while it was turning a corner, the subject fled the area and the female driver could not locate him, Officers checked nearby locations but did not find the male, the female did not think the male was injured when he jumped out.

4/9 – Body found in the river below Cheyenne Drive/Taos Drive, upstream from the Orchard Mesa pedestrian bridge, matched the description of a missing 30 year old male reported earlier in the day; 12^{th} Street & Kennedy Ave – 100 plus people fighting in the roadway, one male was bleeding from his head, 14 officers responded to the call.

4/11 – a male living in Florida called because he was getting messages from his fiancé, over the internet, that she was being held against her will, the SO eventually got permission from renters at the residence to access her apartment, they did not find anyone after a search and the whole incident ended up being an internet scam on the RP; Structure fire at 477 32 Road, the out building was fully engulfed; Structure fire started at 1025 Cedar Way #1 after a blanket was left on a heater.

4/12 - 252 Village Lane – a male subject entered the residence and assaulted an adult female with a bat and told her he would be going after her son then left, the female victim was transported by ambulance to St. Mary's; "Crash Fest" today...especially on North Avenue. $4/13 - 12^{th}$ and Ute – Semi truck and postal vehicle crashed, the postal vehicle caught on fire, no injuries but extensive damage to the vehicle; Grand Mesa Middle School – students found a bomb threat etched into a bathroom wall, no bomb was found, several interviews were completed; A Fed Ex truck hit a pole and knocked out the fiber, this accident resulted in Station 2 alerting and phones to go down for several hours.

4/15 - 3075 F $\frac{1}{2}$ Road – a vehicle rolled and hit a residence, a male fled the accident and ran into a nearby field, a K9 was called out to track the suspect who was thought to be bleeding significantly, subject was not found.

4/16 – I-70 Mile Marker 31 – a vehicle hit a post on the Interstate and drug some cables for approximately 200 yards, the male driver fled behind a business on Horizon Drive and was eventually detained.

4/18 – Lunch Loop Trail – RP called in stating they saw a male with blood on his face in a vehicle possibly holding a rifle, when law enforcement arrived, vehicle occupant was DOA from a self-inflicted gunshot wound; 965 Highway 6 & 50 – a call was received on a 911 open line, call taker could hear a female crying, officers were sent to the area obtained with phase 2 info and found a female who had been hit in the face/head with a hammer and the male suspect prodding her with a machete, the male was taken in to custody and transported to the jail; Fruita – fight involving a tire iron occurred; River View Trailer Park – a fight occurred with a party was kicked in the face.

4/19 – Third Flats/Bangs Canyon – motorcycle crash, patient had broken ribs and a possible punctured lung, CareFlight transported him to St. Mary's; Highway 141/Divide Road area – a base jumper's parachute inverted and bounced him off several rocks down a 200 foot cliff, he landed on some brush, another male in the area found him and CareFlight responded to transport. 4/22 – 1158 White Ave – subject attempted to steal a bicycle out of the back yard of the address, K9 was called to respond and the subject was detained; 103 Glade Park – an intoxicated male was reported shooting a shotgun in to the residence, three vehicles and a house across the street, SO and PD responded and took the subject in to custody who was wanted for failure to comply DUI.

4/23 – Teller Ave and I-70 Business Loop – fully engulfed motor vehicle fire, was knocked out before damage to any other structures occurred; 1268 18 ½ Road – the wind blew a tree down into a house; 2125 I Road – structure fire that was not fully engulfed but did create substantial damage to the home, residence was not occupied.

 $4/24 - 561 \frac{1}{2} 31 \frac{1}{4} Road - vehicle versus 5 year old male, child had a large gash to his knee and the parents transported him to St. Mary's; 3217 I-70 B - Murdoch's – a male suspect attempted to steal a drill from the store, ended up crashing his bike when fleeing, dropped the backpack with the drill that employees recovered and then tried to steal a bike from Gold's Gym parking lot, the SO was able to detain and arrest the male at an address near Clifton Liquors; South of 32 Road bridge – a water truck with trailer rolled and was blocking traffic in both directions, per the RP the driver refused a squad and did not have any noticeable injuries, he then left the scene and was given a ride to his house before law enforcement arrived.$

4/25 - 515 Lawrence Road – a male was raking his lawn and found a hand grenade, several officers and the Bomb team responded and determined it was a real grenade but was handled without incident; Moon Dance RV Park – an uncooperative, suicidal male with a handgun was detained by the SO without incident.

4/26 – multiple suicidal subjects out roaming around and required lengthy searches; Two child poisoning calls, one child got in to Raid spray and the other ingested D-Con; 1725 Escalante – RP found pornographic images of her husband and his 9 year old daughter, husband then called in as suicidal; Area of 304 Pinon Street – multiple shots fired from a passenger vehicle, casings found on the ground and a hole was found in a window of Church; 37 Road and F Road - an abandoned UPS truck was found stuck in the mud near the canal with the right tire falling into the canal; C & F Food Store-Palisade – a male subject walked in to the store, pointed a gun at the clerk and asked her if she had any money, the clerk told the subject she did not and he turned around and walked out; 7th and Wellington – multiple calls regarding sightings of a beaver...stop me if you've heard this one...rogue beaver meandering the streets, was captured by the Critter

Guy but later escaped his trap inside the vehicle, detained a second time and eventually released to the river.

4/27 – a male suspect from a previous incident concerning sex assault on a child was making suicidal threats, law enforcement attempted to locate him at several different locations and eventually took him in to custody without incident after several hours; 488 32 Road – a male subject was shot in the arm, schools were instructed to shelter in place and after a long search the SO cleared to obtain a warrant to search the residence; 727 Galaxy – structure fire that started on the roof, was quickly contained.

 $4/30 - N 12^{th}$ Street & Ouray Ave – a vehicle ran into another vehicle, attempted to leave but struck a light pole, the subjects in that vehicle left the scene and were detained a short time later; 1920 N 10th Street – subject attempted to force entry into the residence then fled from the address, male was later detained near the area.
