#### **Summary-**

9/1 – 487 32 ½ Road – possible murder/suicide – the RP (mother) received a text message at midnight from her daughter stating that her boyfriend was threatening to kill her and himself and at 0500 she sent another text stating she "may need help", deputies responded for a welfare check, no answer at the door so deputies cleared, at 1830 the mother called back stating she hadn't heard from her daughter and she came to town to check on her, neither had reported to work during the day, both were found at the address DOA.

- 9/3 Several parties again including a very large one at 627 Shannon Drive, which did not appear to be college related/registered.
- 9/4 2845 North Ave #4 officer involved shooting male suspect was acting crazy and appeared to be on something, two children under the age of 10 were in the house with the male, officers made entry in to the home and fatally shot the male suspect who was threatening the children with weapons.
- 9/5 718 Horizon Drive- 4 month old infant not breathing/conscious, CPR was coached and the baby was transported to St. Mary's C3.

9/17 – The Winery in Palisade – a Code 5 male subject had a five year old female with him, he had a gun and covered her in blankets, Palisade PD responded and believed he had the gun to the child's head, he actually didn't but they believe his intentions were to kill her, he also had several other weapons and a hatchet, he wanted to use the hatchet and a rock to "bless her and make her his real daughter", officers believed he had been sexually assaulting her over a period of time and he had a backpack of condoms with him, male stated he was going to blow up the earth and go to Mars University, was placed on an M1 hold.

**9/18** – Orchard Avenue Elementary – one vehicle crashed in to the school, no injuries, but a very large hole was left in the side of the building.

**9/20** – a motor vehicle fire was reported about 10 feet from a house, an explosion was heard and the residence was evacuated.

And then CAD Go-Live happened...no supervisor briefing log entries were made after 9/20.
