A Look Back at 2016

Although it may sound like a broken record, we do continue to see signs of recovery in certain segments of our economy, while other aspects of the economy continue to lag. The oil and gas industry in our area further retracted in 2016, but we saw strength and growth in other areas, including real estate. Our lodging taxes continued to grow, indicating vibrant tourism and travel activity, but sales and use taxes remained weak. Some new areas where we are seeing economic growth can be largely attributed to the efforts of a number of dedicated organizations in the community working collaboratively and with the City of Grand Junction on economic development, and the approval of Mesa County as a Rural Jump-Start Zone appears to be generating positive activity. These are good signs and we are remaining hopeful that 2017 brings even more.

2016 kept all City of Grand Junction departments busy as a number of important projects and programs either got underway or continued. Here is what filled the days and weeks of 2016:

Following a successful ballot question in 2015 authorizing the City to play more of a role in broadband, we moved forward with the **development of a broadband master plan** and began laying the foundation for the future of high-speed internet access in Grand Junction. ~ Early in 2016, our community was rocked to its core when **Mesa County Sheriff Deputy Derek Geer** was killed in the line of duty. The rallying of the community behind Deputy Geer's family and the public safety community, as well as around the "Geer Strong" tag line

and blue line symbolism, demonstrated a solidarity the likes of which Grand Junction had not seen in some time. ~ City Council held a special workshop to hear a presentation regarding the feasibility of potentially constructing an event center in downtown Grand Junction. Following the presentation, a team of locals traveled to Boise, ID to gain an understanding of their experience with their event center. The topic does have its critics, but it also has its supporters. If after careful assessment it is found to be viable for Grand Junction, it will be strategically planned in the coming years. ~ A new Fire Station #4 opened on B 1/2 Road on Orchard Mesa putting us in a position to better serve the residences and businesses in the Orchard Mesa and Pear Park areas. The prior Fire Station #4 on 27 Road has been repurposed to solve some facility issues for the Wastewater Division and will enhance customer service to those living in the area. ~ A second significant event in 2016 that rallied our community was the passing of childhood cancer advocate and champion, Delaney Clements. Delaney's life was cut far too short, but not before she touched the hearts and souls of most who live here, with her big smile and even bigger spirit. A Community Memorial Tree, recognizing Delaney and all local heroes who come after her, has been dedicated in Lincoln Park by the Grand Junction Parks and Recreation Department. ~ A roadway improvement project along North Avenue vastly upgraded the look and function of the area between 12th Street and 23rd Street. The project brought eight-foot-wide sidewalks separated from vehicle lanes by landscape to create more of a barrier between fast-moving traffic and pedestrians, as well as pedestrian lighting and median improvements. The City also invested in underground conduit for an eventual broadband provider to bring gigabit speeds to businesses along this corridor. The project was funded mainly by a \$1.2 million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation and a \$600,000 grant from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs. ~ In June, Greg Caton joined the City of Grand Junction as City Manager, bringing with him many years of solid experience and success in city management in Colorado and Arizona. He hit the ground running and made fast business of developing relationships in the community and getting a good handle on the needs and issues facing the City. We look forward to many successes ahead under his leadership. ~ Work got underway to begin preparation for the reconstruction of 1st Street between Ouray and North Avenues. The much-awaited reconstruction is just one street project on a list of many that are needed. Open houses and other outreach efforts are underway to gather community feedback on the City proceeding with a plan to accelerate funding to streets projects in an effort to improve the overall pavement condition index score and build our infrastructure back up to where it was prior to the downturn in the economy.

As we move into 2017, we continue to have many needs and projects ahead of us. The plan will continue to be to proceed with optimism for a strengthening economy and sustained prosperity, and to focus on providing the highest level of service to the residents of Grand Junction.



The main source of revenue the City uses for general government is generated from taxes. Seventy-three percent is in the form of sales and use tax with only 18% of that amount being paid by Grand Junction residents.



Monthly Cost of Service Per City Household


2016 Estimated Operating Budget by Service Area




The average City Household will pay \$501 in annual taxes received by the City, or \$41.73 per month, in support of all general government services provided by the City of Grand Junction.
