There is no doubt that 2018 is shaping up to be a busy year for us. We are working hard on finding a way to expand broadband within our community; we are on the threshold of the creation of a cutting-edge business park along the Colorado River at Las Colonias Park; we have more street maintenance projects on deck; and working in concert with our dedicated City staff, we will be implementing the priorities outlined in our strategic plan.

The photos in this calendar capture the beauty of the area we are all so fortunate to be able to call home. However, the real beauty of our community comes from within. It comes from the giving, caring, "roll up your sleeves" nature of the people who live and work here. I would not want to call any other place home. I am extremely proud of our community and equally optimistic about the opportunities and many good things still down the road for us.

# Checking Back in on 2017

Fast forward just twelve months from when this section of the calendar was last written and we are starting to see some promising activity in our local economy. Unemployment rates are decreasing, real estate values and transactions are on the increase, foreclosures are down, new home construction is growing, sales tax revenues (which provide a good indicator that people are spending money on discretionary items) are slowly rebounding and we are seeing vacant commercial sites starting to fill up. This is all good news and news that we hope not only continues but strengthens as we move into 2018.

2017 was a busy year with a number of accomplishments worth celebrating and a number of situations that helped shape the year. Here is what unfolded:

We started off 2017 with an unprecedented weather event for the Grand Valley. On January 9, our area was struck by an ice storm, reportedly the first in Grand Junction history. The weather paralyzed the Grand Valley while emergency and public works crews worked relentlessly to try to keep up with the 900+calls that were placed to our 9-1-1 dispatch center. ~ In early January the City contracted with Pinnacle Venue Services to provide management for Two Rivers Convention Center and the Avalon Theatre. By mid-year, this relationship was demonstrating success with strong sales activity, positive net revenue, the addition of new events and a series of new protocols and procedures aimed at reducing long-term costs. ~ In early February, City Council awarded a contract to reconstruct 1st Street, a much-needed and long-awaited infrastructure improvement project. ~ In March, plans were unveiled to create

a business park at the east end of Las Colonias Park. The business park, which will ultimately include a business campus focused on the outdoor recreation industry and light manufacturing, will be anchored by Bonsai Design and will include public amenities such as a lake and a dog park. ~ In April, two ballot questions were presented to Grand Junction voters. One requested an increase in sales tax to fund a downtown event center (2A) and one requested approval to use the Riverside Parkway bonds savings account to increase investment in street maintenance (2B). The event center ballot question was not approved by the voters, but the street maintenance ballot question was. Thanks to the affirmative vote, increased investment in road construction and pavement preservation projects got underway shortly thereafter. ~ Also a product of the April ballot was the election of new City Councilmember Duke Wortmann, representing District D, and shortly thereafter we congratulated new Mayor Rick Taggart and new Mayor Pro Tem Bennett Boeschenstein. ~ In late April, the City of Grand Junction welcomed new Community Development Director Tamra Allen. ~ A few changes were made to the Downtown landscape in May that contributed to keeping the experience there enjoyable for all. Through a partnership with the Downtown Business Improvement District, two police officers were dedicated to Downtown patrol, the Police Department's Parks Patrol Unit was incorporated into the Downtown environment and volunteer Ambassadors were recruited to assist with information and fostering a welcoming environment. ~ Especially hot and dry conditions during June and early July generated an increase in high-risk fire calls that kept the Grand Junction Fire Department responding at an unprecedented pace. Illegal burning, illegal fireworks, and other careless factors contributed to situations resulting

in injuries, loss of homes and property and evacuations at all hours. ~ In July, we celebrated the grand opening of the Amphitheater at Las Colonias Park with a community ice cream social and free concert. The venue has been the host of several concerts since and the excitement for next year's lineup is growing. ~ On August 16, City Council unanimously adopted the City's Strategic Plan. The document, which focuses on the guiding principles of Public Safety, Planning & Infrastructure, Diversification of our Economic Base and Communication, Outreach & Engagement, will serve as a guide for the City Council and City staff over the course of the next two years. ~ Following the retirement of long-term City Clerk Stephanie Tuin, we welcomed new City Clerk Wanda Winkelmann to the organization. ~ The Visitor and Convention Bureau held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to announce and launch the renaming of their organization to "Visit Grand Junction". The new label, which is a common approach among tourism marketing organizations, will create consistency between the website name, social media handles and the organization.

As we move into 2018, we continue to focus on the needs and opportunities we have before us while continuing to provide outstanding service to the residents of Grand Junction.



At print time, the 2018 budget was still being developed.





The main source of revenue the City uses for general government is generated from taxes. Seventy-three percent is in the form of sales and use tax with only 22% of that amount being paid by Grand Junction residents.

## **Monthly Cost of Service Per City Household**


2017 Estimated Operating Budget by Service Area




The average City Household will pay \$547 in annual taxes received by the City, or \$45.62 per month, in support of all general government services provided by the City of Grand Junction.
