

6/26/2018 2018-00097 A letter was received from the All Crimes Enforcement Team out of Craig, CO and states: On September 29, 2016 Task Force Officers with the All Crimes Enforcement Team executed a search warrant on a known narcotics distribution house in Craig, Colorado. During the search of the house a video security system was found, upon viewing the video task force officers discovered the criminal masterminds were recording their drug transactions. Task Force Officers could view the video recordings but we were unable to download and save the videos for evidence. I reached out to and explained the situation. **** was very helpful and offered his assistance in retrieving the videos off the recording device, which he was successfully able to do. Due impart to ****'s willingness to assist and his ability to retrieve the video the defendant in this case received 6 years in the Colorado Department of Corrections. In September 2017, **** again agreed to assist our task force in retrieving video off a video security system that was seized from a known drug dealers residence in Craig, Colorado **** was able to retrieve the video from the device. His assistance helped in a successful conclusion to this case, where the defendant took a plea deal and is currently serving 22 years in the Colorado Department of Corrections. **** encompasses the Grand Junction Police Department's Vision, mission and Values and I want to thank him for his professionalism and assistance in these cases.

<u>Summary</u> (crime scenes activity, court appearances, complex cases, use of resources, problems or unusual events):

DigitalOnQ was implemented in March. For the past three months, Officers have uploaded an average of 7,560 files each month to the system. We have seen a 95% reduction in the number of discs submitted to evidence that require handling and filing since January. In January, 2104 discs were submitted to evidence. In June, only 113.

One of the three Evidence Technicians is out on FMLA for the next three months. Public release hours were reduced to help with the staffing shortage during the busy summer months.

Victim Services Program

Summary

Meetings/events:

- Coordinator attended newly-established monthly meeting for victim advocate coordinators, as initiated by WSCC grant guidelines.
- Coordinator attended monthly meeting of Western Slope Volunteer Management Assn.

Training:

- Coordinator attended monthly resiliency program training at WSCC
- Coordinator accompanied three VAPs to Effective Communication," a training led by City Trainer Beth McGrath
- Best practices were discussed at the VAP monthly meeting, since three new VAP recruits were introduced and welcomed.

Other:

- Coordinator began "Immersion VAP Academy" for three VAP candidates, aimed at getting the recruits shadowing in the field in conjunction with classroom training. This is to offset the decreased number of active VAPs during this quarter (two are on medical leave, and one was dismissed). Recruitment efforts for a fall VAP academy are underway.
- Volunteer placed 42 follow-up calls to victims of inactivated property crimes (talked directly with 15 victims; others were left voice messages).
