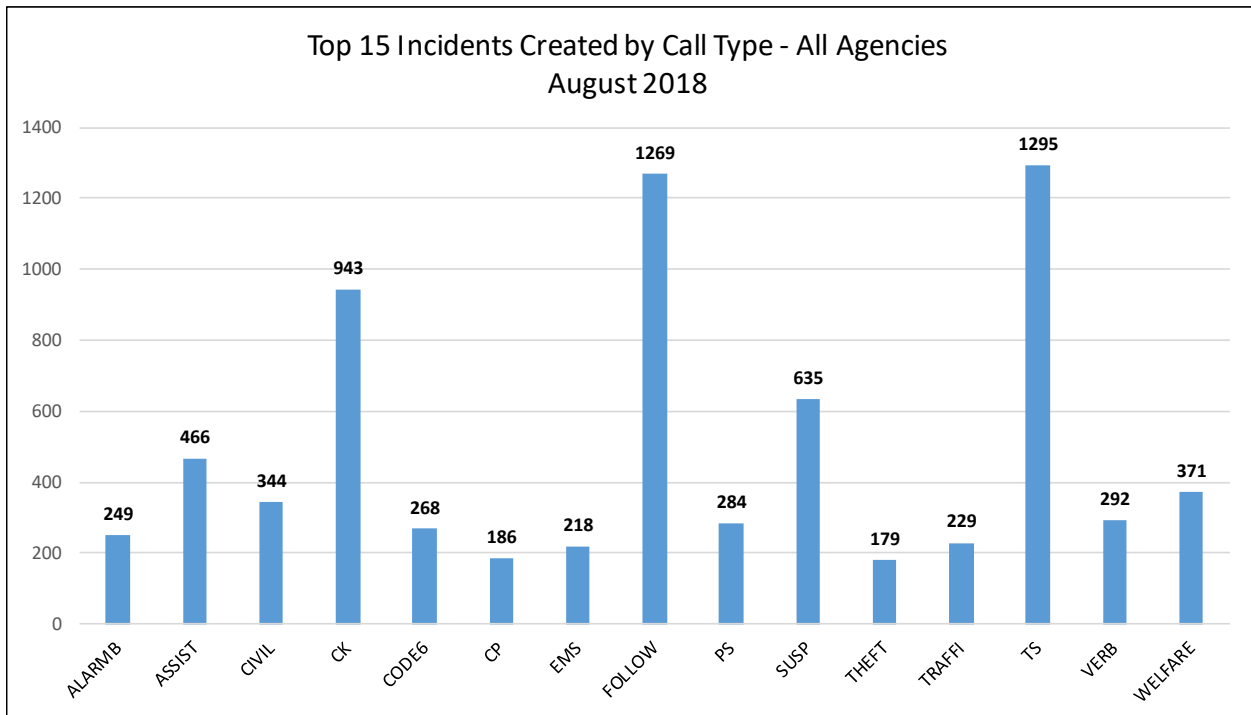

Use of force

8/2/2018 2018-00123 Officers were attempting to prevent a suspect from returning to the address where he committed a crime and the suspect was refusing. Officers attempted to place the suspect under arrest and he resisted and then kneed one of the officers in the groin. The officer responded by grabbing the back of the suspects head and kneeling the suspect twice, with contact to the suspect's chest and the left eye. The suspect was then taken into custody without further incident.

8/3/2018 2018-00113 Officers contacted subject for trespassing in the park and subject refused to ID himself and was verbally aggressive. Subject was placed in handcuffs and leaned forward and was placed on the ground. Subject later claimed he was injured by the officers while on the ground.

8/5/2018 2018-00116 Officer responded to a report of a stabbing at 436 Main St. and was attempting to locate a suspect. Officer attempted contact with a male, who ran from him and was thought to possibly the suspect in the stabbing. Officer pursued the suspect and told him to stop several times, suspect stopped and faced officer and told him "fuck you" and then took steps toward officer with clenched fists. Officer deployed his taser and was able to take suspect into custody without further incident.

8/6/2018 2018-00119 Officers were dispatched to a felony menacing/assault that was actively occurring near 28 Rd. and North Ave. and heading westbound on North Ave. The suspect was in a vehicle following the victim who had a child with her in her vehicle. Office Donohue observed the suspect vehicle as it turned southbound on 12th St. from North Ave and the suspect vehicle struck the victim vehicle. Office Donohue attempted to stop the suspect vehicle and the vehicle fled, Officer Donohue pursued the suspect vehicle for approx 1.7 miles until he decided to terminate the pursuit due the high speeds of the suspect vehicle and the fact that he would not be able to catch the vehicle. The pursuit was deemed as within policy and appropriate for the crime and conditions of the traic, time of day and roadway.

Summary (crime scenes activity, court appearances, complex cases, use of resources, problems or unusual events):

In 2008, when the evidence in the Quonset hut was moved, several boxes of latent fingerprint cards (i.e. fingerprint cards found at crime scenes) were found. These were from 1976 until 1989 and appeared to be every case where latent print cards were submitted. Back then, latent print cards were kept separate from the other evidence in a case and were not tracked with other evidence, so they had not been destroyed when cases were disposed of. Each case had to be researched before the cards could be destroyed as certain crimes (i.e. homicides, kidnapping, forgery, and certain sex offenses) can still be prosecuted. To make this tedious task even worse, most of the cases were now on microfilm. Most of the cases have since been scanned from microfilm to scanned images stored on a network drive. Evidence staff did not have the time to research these cases in addition to the already insurmountable amount of evidence we already track. We used volunteers over the past few years to research each case and set aside those print cards that needed to be booked with any remaining evidence. This project was finally finished this month.
