Signs of Recovery

- There are many signs that Grand Junction continues to pull out of the recession:
 - ✓ New business-use of new and remodeled buildings
 - ✓ Development permits are up-residential building
 - ✓ Local unemployment rates dropped from 9.6% to 8.1% during 2012
 - ✓ Have gained back over ½ of jobs lost since recession
 - ✓ Business indexes are showing growth
 - ✓ Local and State employers are increasing wages
- The 2013 budget contains moderate increases in operating and labor costs, and significant capital projects that will continue to create jobs and stimulate the local economy.

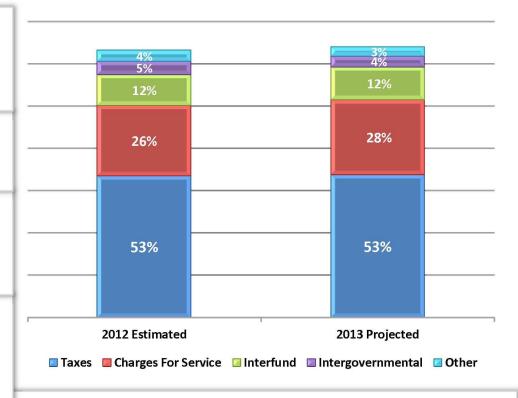
Revenues

Other revenue is made up of fines, tap charges, licenses, permits, and interest.

Intergovernmental revenue is State or Federal grant revenues.

Interfund revenue are the internal charges for fleet, technology, and insurance.

The majority of Charges for Service comes from utility fees, rural fire district contract, ambulance transports, and the E911 surcharge.

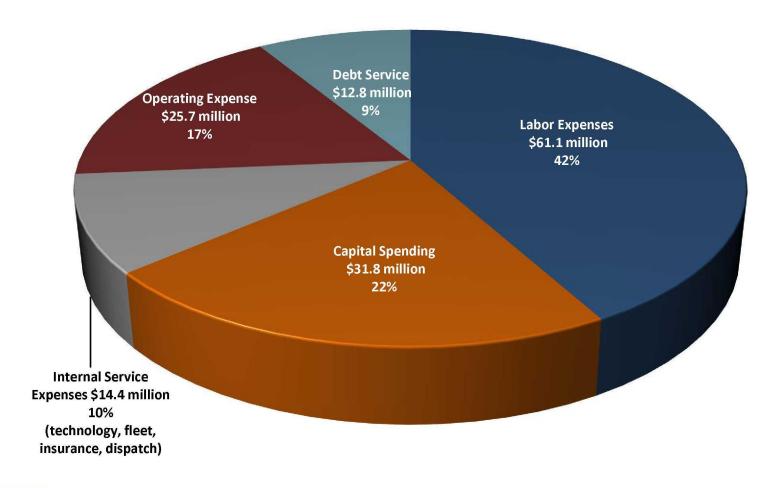


Over 3/4 of Taxes are from Sales and Use Taxes. Also includes property , lodging , highway users, severance and franchise tax.



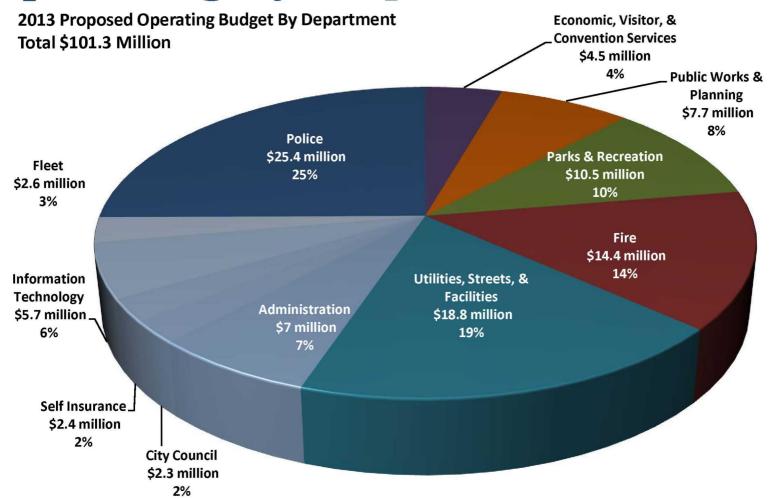
Spending By Type

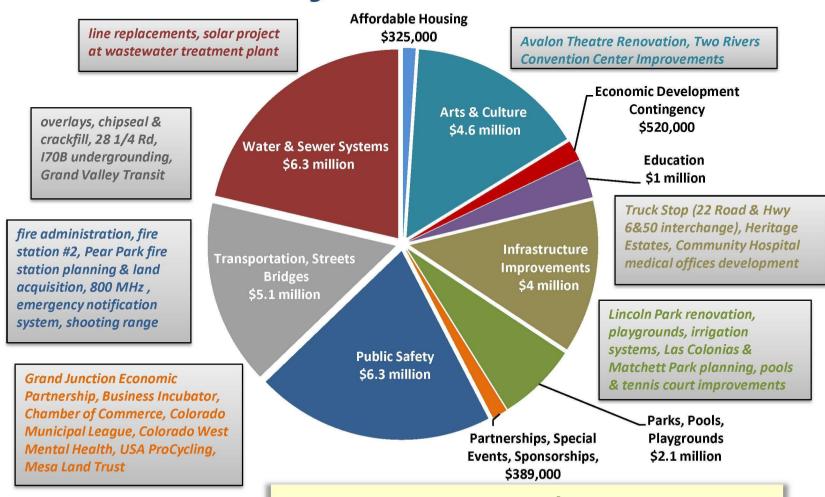
