## **PROCLAMATION**

- WHEREAS, recycling saves precious energy, conserves valuable natural resources, protects the environment, reduces landfill needs and has a positive economic impact, creating jobs, and paying citizens for their recycling efforts; and
- WHEREAS, recycling in Colorado is an untapped economic development resource; and
- WHEREAS, even though recycling is good for the environment and the economy, Colorado lags behind other states in its recycling efforts. The U.S. overall recycling rate is 28.5% and Colorado's rate is 12.5%; and
- WHEREAS, Colorado is currently ranked at 41<sup>st</sup> in the nation for recycling, putting us well behind most states, according to BioCycle Magazine; and
- WHEREAS, drop off recycling is available in this community on River Road for aluminum cans, steel cans, glass bottles, paper, cardboard, phonebooks, #1 and #2 plastics. Mesa County has a HHW facility to collect hazardous wastes such as paint and pesticides. There is an electronics recycling drop off available at Batteries Plus, and there is a compost facility for green waste; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Grand Junction has a curbside program with approximately 3,000 city residents enrolled and more on waiting lists; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Grand Junction supports recycling and goes to great lengths to separate and recycle tires during the Annual Spring Clean-up.

NOW THEREFORE, I, James J. Doody, by the power vested in me as Mayor of the City of Grand Junction, do herby proclaim November 15, 2006 as

## "Recycling Day"

in the City of Grand Junction and encourage citizens, governments and other organizations to do more to promote recycling in Colorado by participating and supporting recycling programs.
