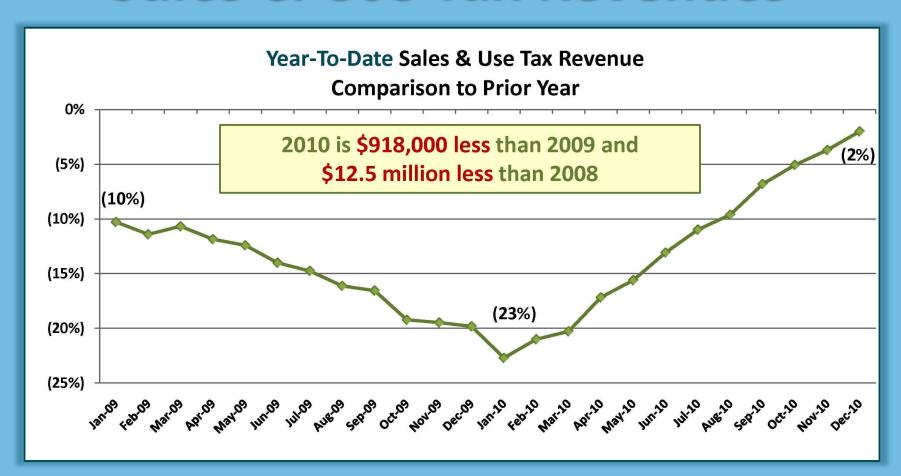

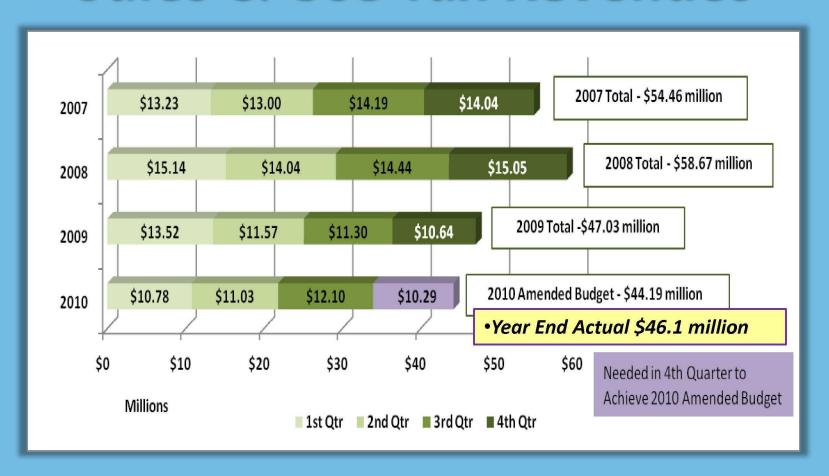


Sales & Use Tax Revenues





Sales & Use Tax Revenues



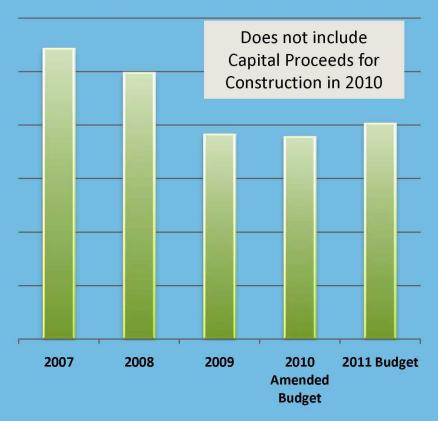


Declining Revenues

Government Revenues (sales and use taxes, development fees, severance & mineral leasing)

- \$23 million decrease 2008
 to 2010 = (24%) loss of
 revenue
- \$14.5 million of that decrease was in sales and use taxes = a (25%) drop

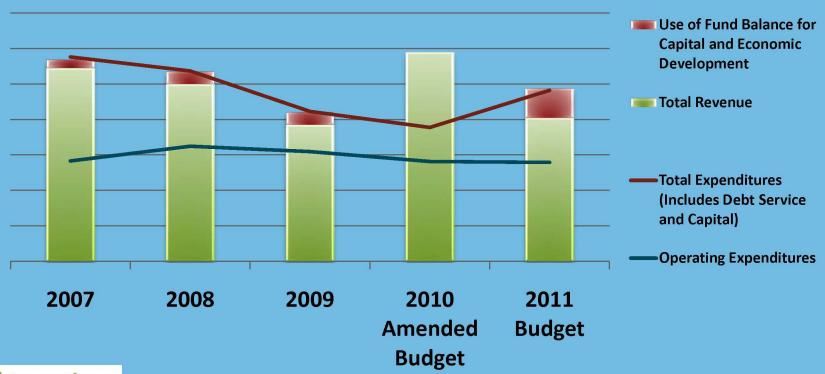
5 Year Trend Government Operating Revenues





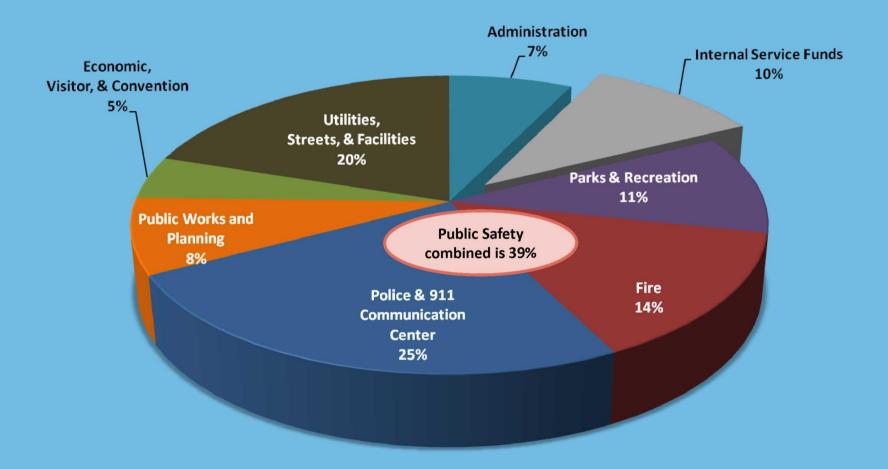
Government Funds Budget

- The 2011 Budget increases due to debt service & capital commitments





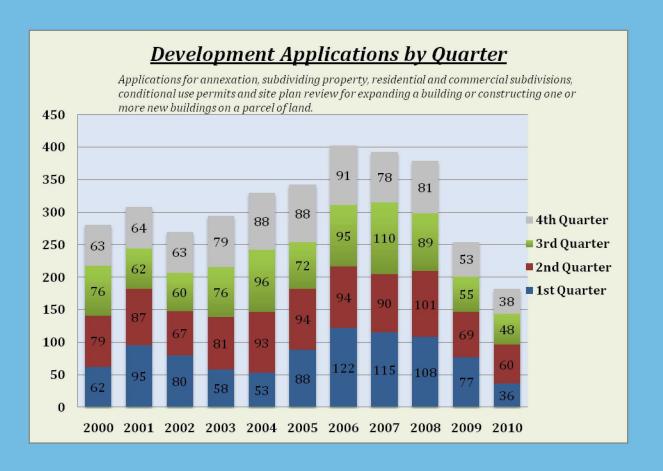
2011 Operating Budget by Department



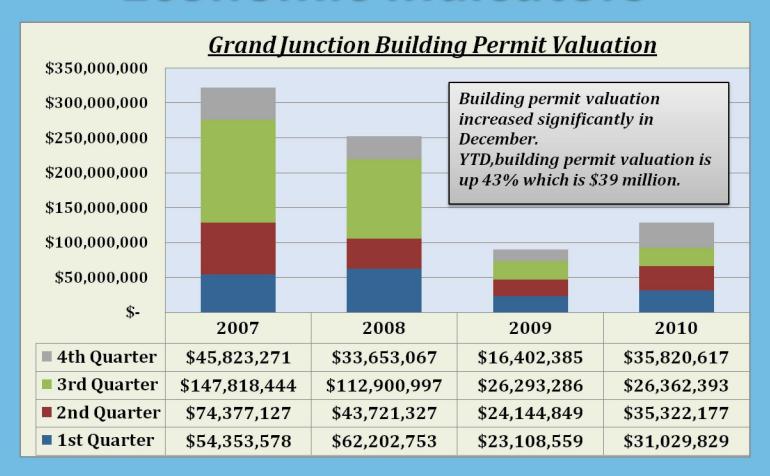








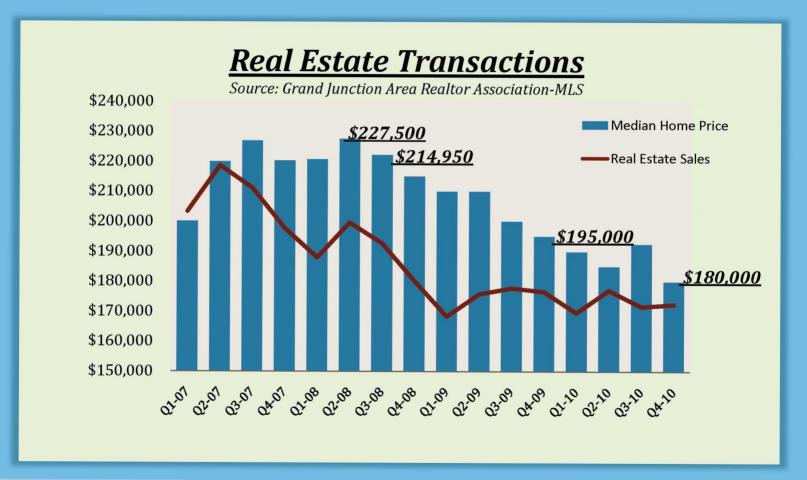








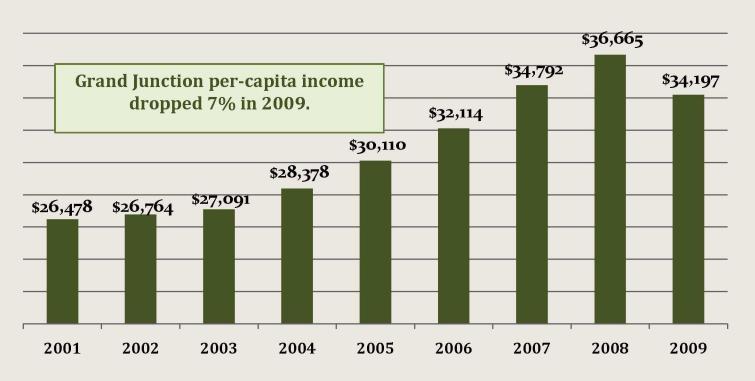




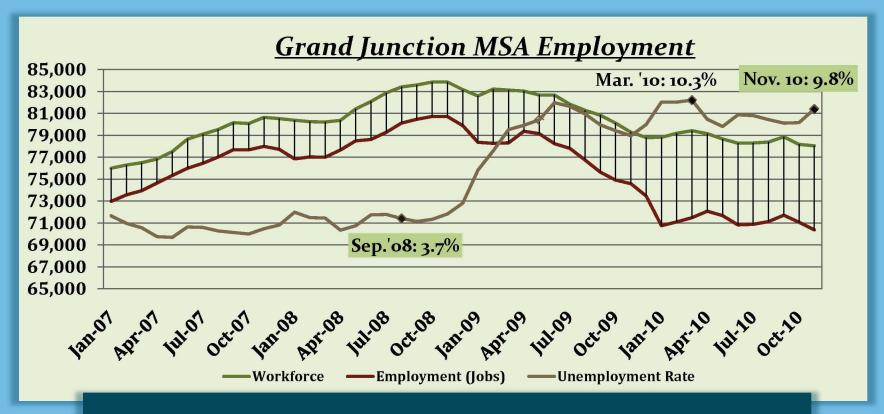


Personal Income Per-Capita

The unemployment increased to 9.8%. Nearly 10,000 jobs were lost during 2009. After a gain at the beginning of 2010; in October and November, Grand Junction lost another 1,300 jobs.



Geography of a Recession







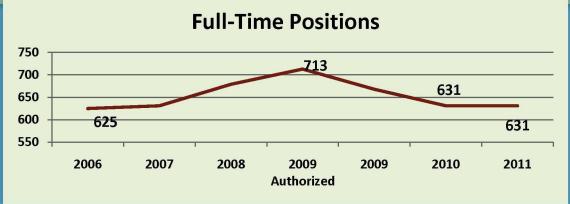
- U. S. Census Bureau 2010 Census
 - U.S. population increased 9.7% over the 2000 Census population
 - Colorado grew by 16.9% from 2000 to 2010
 - Mesa County's population increased 18.6 % from 2000 to 2010
 - Grand Junction grew 27.6% between 2000 and 2010 which averages 2.8% per year

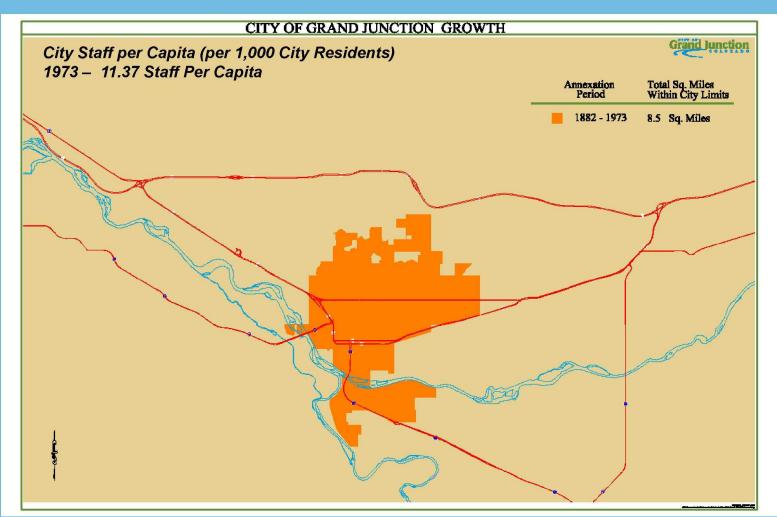
- City's service area has grown 5 times over since 1973
- Staff per capita was at its highest in 1988 at 13.66
- Currently City staff per capita is the lowest point in at least 37 years



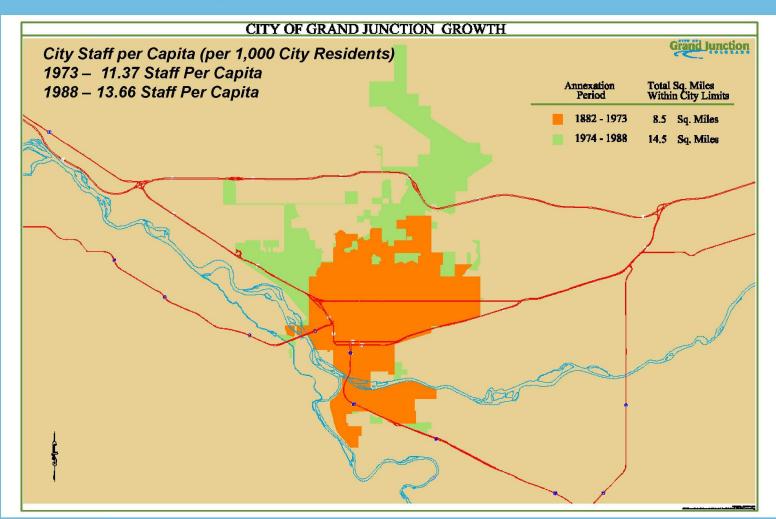
Personnel & Benefits

- Insurance (single coverage)
 - Local market pays 87%
 - Municipal market pays 91%
 - City pays 78%
- Retirement Plans
 - All market employers offer a retirement/profit sharing plan
 - Average % contribution for both markets is greater than City's
- Paid Time Off (PTO)
 - Includes vacation time, sick leave, and holidays
 - City's PTO is less than local and municipal market employers

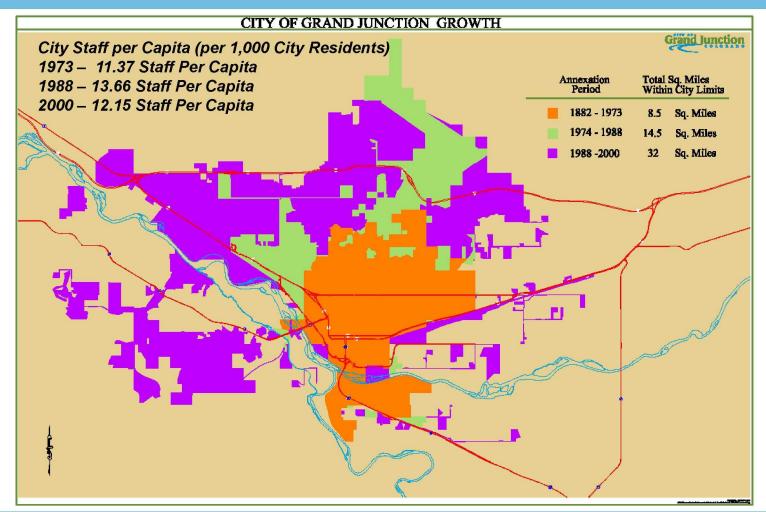




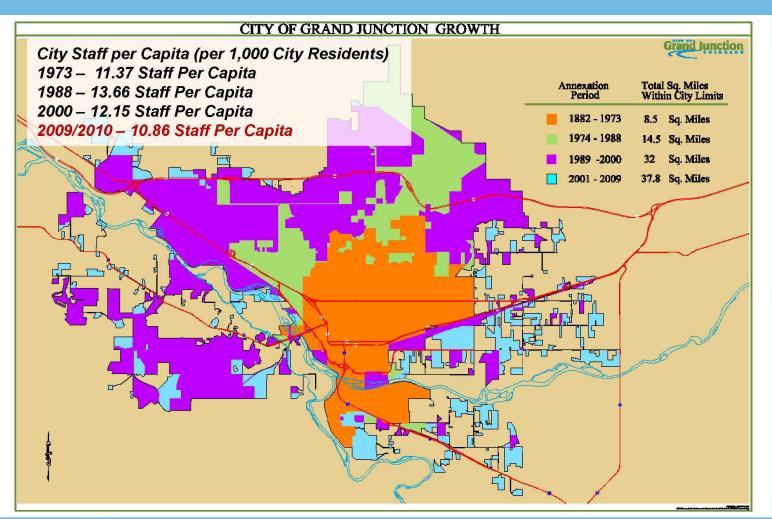














Capital

- Capital projects have a significant financial impact on the local economy in the form of jobs, wages and spending (\$1.75 for every capital dollar spent)
- In the last 6 years alone, the City has invested over \$249 million in capital projects and has another \$42 million planned for 2011 (over \$500 million in local impact)
- As a form of local stimulus the City pushed forward over \$13.6 million in capital projects in 2009 & 2010 irrigation, water, and sewer lines

• Three major projects moving forward in 2011 including finishing 29 Road,

the Stadium and Public Safety

The City has historically dedicated over 35% of budget to capital each year.



Local Capital Spending

- •Capital expenditures totaled \$26.2 million in 2009 with the majority of those expenditures for capital construction projects.
- •2009 Capital construction projects totaled \$19.3 million for \$33.8 million in local economic impact
- •Nearly 60% of expenditures went to local businesses, with another 2% going to Western Slope businesses and 22% to Colorado vendors
